BREAKING BARRIERS, INCREASING SUPPORT

The Minnesota Department of Public Safety is investing in Bemidji youth and families through a grant called PASSAR: Providing Access, Safety & Support at Ridgeway. Right before the pandemic, the Rotary Neighborhood Initiative (RNI) began weekly meetings with key community partners and residents of the Ridgeway neighborhood to understand the challenges and barriers facing residents while brainstorming opportunities to collaborate. This 15-month grant is now helping to fund youth, adult and neighborhood programs within the Ridgeway area. It's also helping to create a web of support services with additional agencies, encourage positive relationship-building efforts and develop a strategic plan for the future. Thanks to partners like RNI, Bemidji Police Department, Village of Hope, Sanford Health, Peacemaker Resources, and the Boys & Girls Club we are working together to help change conditions that lead to community violence, reduce barriers for people experiencing poverty, increase tenant social support and knowledge to enhance quality of life for all who reside in and near the Ridgeway area. It's amazing what we can do when we work

The garden program continues to expand to provide education for youth, funded by a MN Department of Agriculture grant and dedicated Club donors. Children still grow each plant from seed, accessing over 30 different kinds of produce, and now participate in culinary skill sessions led by Chef Isaac Welle.

In the last few months, Club members made basil pesto, rhubarb crisp, and roasted tomatoes, all featuring produce grown at the Club.


New sustainable practices include a composting program led by Club members and a reduction in single-use paper and plastic products. Club members and staff are sharing their experiences with hydroponic growing thorugh a partnership with Bemidji Middle School. Grant support allowed the Club to purchase another Fork Farms hydroponic vertical system, co-located at BMS for 7th-grade classroom instruction. Club staff are helping Bemidji middle schoolers practice STEM learning through

EXPANDED + NEW PARTNERSHIPSto Serve Those Who Need Us Most

The Club is positioned to play a critical role in meeting the needs of area youth, especially those who need us most. Through the Ignite Believe & Build Afterschool grant, we are expanding our services



Together with staff from the Bemidji School District we are identifying 75 students, who are in danger of falling between the cracks due to challenges faced during the pandemic, to become Club members and experience our quality programs, healthy

snacks, and caring adults. New and expanded partnerships with Headwaters Science Center, Peacemaker Resources, Bemidji Public Library, and Bemidji Community Theater open doors for Club kids to engage in the community through weekly field trips. The Club hired Talaya Kautz

as our Ignite Assistant Director to oversee the implementation and success of this grant over the next two school years.

The opportunity for youth to develop strong, trusting relationships with caring adults help buffer the impact of adverse childhood experiences and trauma. Research shows that engagement indicators such as attendance, behavior, and classroom performance rise when students regularly participate in quality afterschool programs like the Boys & Girls Club.
